
Chris Morash ('60) turned 92 this year. (Wait, that can't be right! - must be 92 & 60.)



In June, we spent a day with Steinar Sevje in Oslo during which he regaled us with the following story.



How I ended up in the Chamber Singers Steinar Sevye ('05)

I wanted to do the last year of my Norwegian teaching degree as an exchange student. I had checked if there were any universities in Seattle on the list of schools I could choose, since that's where I wanted to be. Alas, there weren't any, and the only university that was even remotely close was UVic. So I listed UVic on my exchange application.

Coming from little Norway, I thought I could just show up on the first day of school and start the classes I had found online and written on my application to the student administration in Oslo. I arrived in Seattle a week before the first day of classes and spent a couple of days there. It was nice. I met a girl who said I could sleep on her couch although she had no couch....

I took the Clipper to Victoria with still four days to spare before classes, so I booked a bed in the Backpackers Inn. Victoria was very nice, so I didn't get my butt to the campus until there was only a single day left before classes were to begin. That's when I found out about how you have to register for classes. I had not done this. I had not applied for student housing either, so I suddenly realized I had no classes and no place to stay. I thought, coming from a socialist country, that these things were arranged. After a few minutes of cooling down and accepting the situation, I found a nice lady in the music department to help me sort my schedule out. I

got a few music education classes that would be in line with what I was doing back home; "Music in the classroom 306" I think was one of them. I also got Conducting 201 with Capaldo, and being the last one to come to class, I got the trumpet as my instrument. I also got quite a few music classes, like vocal jazz, music composition with "Butterfly", and a few more. For someone who had never really studied music, this was quite a difficult schedule. I would have some trouble over the next few months, but I learned a hellovalot after a year of all those classes.

I also needed a choir credit. I remember being told there were 3 choirs: a women's choir (not for me), a choir for everyone (as someone who loves to sing, I interpreted this as "the shitty choir"), and the Chamber Singers. "But you can almost forget about the Chamber Singers", I remember her say. "It's really hard to get in, and the auditions are almost done. It's down the hall. You can try, if you want. Just sign up and wait." (Or something like that.) So I signed up at the bottom of a list as long as a Norwegian night in the winter. There were ten kids sitting in the corridor. I felt very old, being 26 around these kids. I figured I had a few hours before my turn, so I went for a walk on campus. All those bunnies. Funny. I had a taste of the fresh BC air while I was waiting, and I enjoyed the great weather. After a while my mouth was getting really dry, so I went in to get a drink and decided to check on the list. The door was open and Bruce told me to come in. He gave me some sheets of music and told me to sing. I don't have perfect pitch, so I asked for a starting note and did as well as I could. I didn't feel like it went very well. I had been able to read music somewhat when I was a bit younger but had not practiced for a long time and had never sung to music before.


Somehow, I got the gig. I was later told by Bruce that this was not for my singing abilities, but what do I care. Thanks to that audition, I met the best people possible that year. Lots of music, bands, karaoke, tours. I ended up living with one of the tenors, and I even hung out with some of the basses. Memories and friendships for life - none mentioned, none forgotten. I love you all and think of you when I hear great a cappella choir music.
