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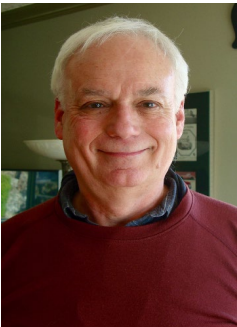
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President's Column

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Welcome to New Board Members

Notable Broadmead Resident: Author Nancy J. Hughes

Author Nancy Hughes, a Broadmead resident, has a knack for research. She is resourceful in tracking down information including photographs, letters, records, and personal histories. Nancy’s motto is, “Seek and you shall find”.

Nancy’s ancestral family moved to Victoria in 1885, and she has lived in various Greater Victoria communities. She has been a Broadmead resident for the past 13 years. She is married and is the mother of two, one of whom is another Broadmead resident. Her grandfather Walter held BC driver’s license #1, and her grandmother Florence held BC driver’s license #2, so Nancy is genetically predisposed to being a self-starter. Therefore, it is no surprise that she self-published her two books.

Her first book, *Built by Luney Brothers Ltd.: Building a City* and *a Legacy Brick by Brick* was published in 2010. It was a topic close to her heart as it chronicles her grandfather’s and his brother’s pioneer Victoria construction company; they built a substantial number of Victoria buildings. When asked why she undertook to write this book, Nancy replied, “There were ample writings about Victoria architecture, but there was no record about Victoria builders. I wrote it as a reference.” Not only did she do the research and writing, she was instrumental in the design and layout of the book.

Nancy’s second book, *Found Art: Of the Clans Erskine & Holland*

was self-published in 2016. It recounts the story of family treasures she inherited that once belonged to Scotland and England’s nobility. During her research, Nancy discovered she is connected to the Erskine family through her biological mother. Nancy’s purpose in writing this book was to draw attention to the collection and to find a permanent place for it in England and Scotland.

Nancy highly recommends self-publishing. “It opens up so many doors!” Following her publications, she has been contacted by museum curators, historians, other aspiring authors and researchers.

Aside from being an author, Nancy has many other talents and interests. She speaks Mandarin, which she honed by attending UVic for five years, and by attending two summer sessions at East China Normal School in the 70’s. At the tender age of 50, Nancy attained her brown belt in karate. She currently volunteers at the Costume Museum at Government House. Nancy enjoys walking, and you may run into her on one of the Broadmead trails that she so loves.

Renovations at Broadmead Village

2018 is bringing improvements to Broadmead Village shopping centre!

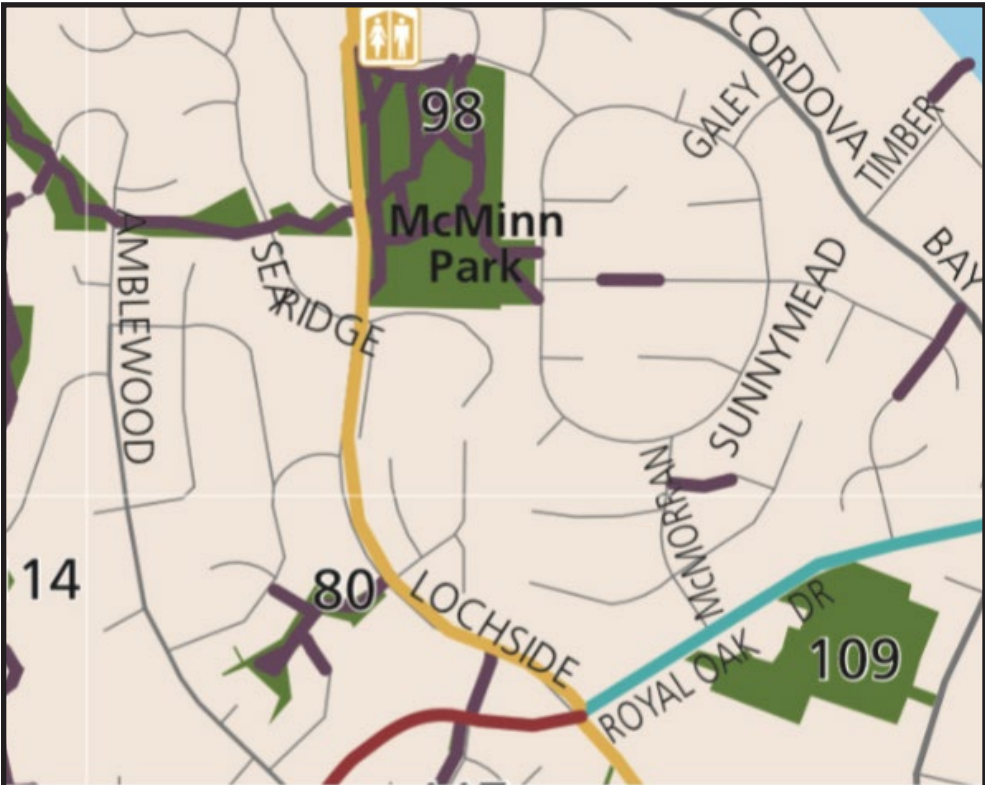
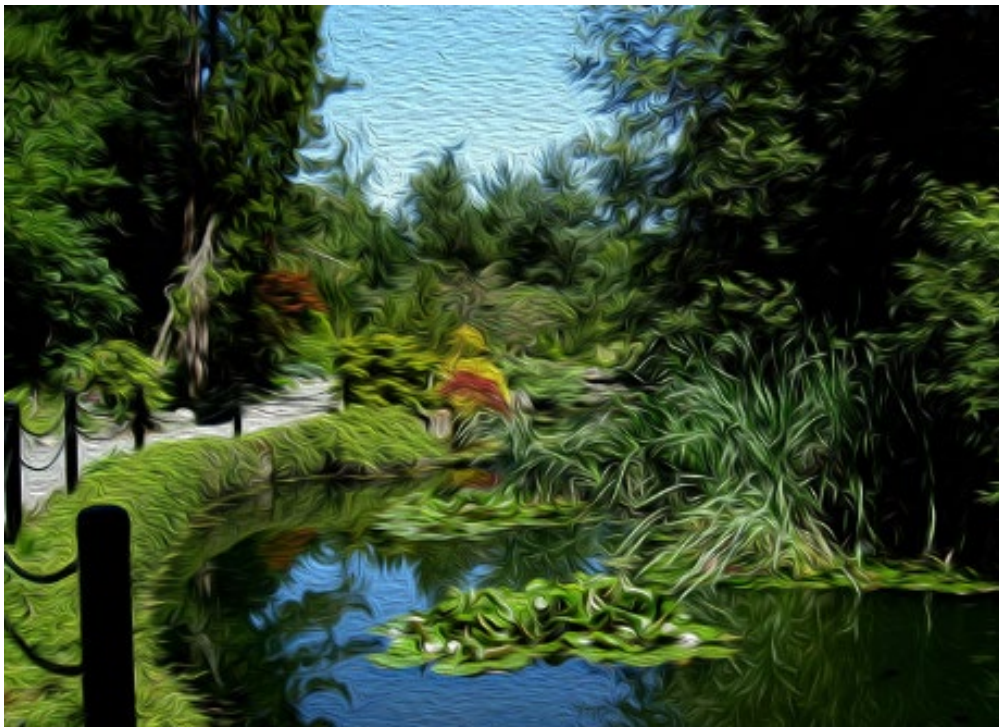
As of the writing of this article, the Canadian Tire store is undergoing exterior and some interior upgrades. Representatives from Canadian Tire Real Estate Ltd. have advised BARA that they have worked closely with Grosvenor Americas (the owner of Broadmead Village) to adopt similar exterior finishes utilized in the shopping centre including exterior wooden features and stone work. New, wider sliding glass doors have been installed. As well, new same sized, non-illuminated signage will replace the existing building signage. The area behind the store and the parking lot will receive some upgrades. The renovation is expected to take about two months to complete.

In addition to the changes to the Canadian Tire property, Grosvenor Americas has advised a modest update and renovation to the Thrifty Foods store at Broadmead Village will take place in order to better serve the community. The exterior of the store will be updated to include design elements which will integrate the store into the rest of Broadmead Village. It is hoped that construction will start in the summer of 2018 and finish about seven months later. The store will remain open and the renovation will take place in stages.

Outerbridge Park: Restoration for a Beloved Property

Have you ever wondered about the history of Outerbridge Park?

This Saanich Park was originally named Shangri-la Bird and Nature Sanctuary by its founder, Joan Outerbridge. Joan was born in Bermuda in 1920 and was a nature lover from an early age. By age 17, she was collecting and preserving specimens for the Bermuda Museum. In 1952, Joan graduated from The Horticultural School in Pennsylvania. She returned to live in Bermuda until her move to Victoria in 1984. When she purchased her home on Royal Oak Drive, Joan began the process of creating a nature sanctuary. She accomplished this goal by buying a nearby house, subdividing off most of the backyard for the nature sanctuary, renovating the house, and using the profits from the sale to do it again. She repeated this

process over the course of more than a decade with seven houses including her own.

Joan Outerbridge transferred the property to the Municipality of Saanich in 2005. A significant amount of restoration work was done by volunteers from the Horticultural Centre of the Pacific. Specifically, a tremendous amount of invasive species removal took place during this time. In 2008, the main trail was upgraded and a new wooden bridge was installed; the parking lot was added in 2009. This work was paid for by private donations as well as Saanich Parks funds. Outerbridge Park is now maintained by Pulling Together volunteers and Saanich horticultural staff.

Outerbridge Park is located adjacent to 1181 Royal Oak Drive and consists of 3.8 hectares. It includes a natural area as well as a cultivated section with ornamental plants and a pool. The trail is wide and accessible to wheelchairs.

For those interested, the Rocky Point Bird Observatory hosts bird walks at Outerbridge Park on the second Sunday of each month. The meet up is at 9 AM at the parking lot on Royal Oak Drive. Further information: rpbo@rpbo.org.

McMinn Park Renovations on Schedule

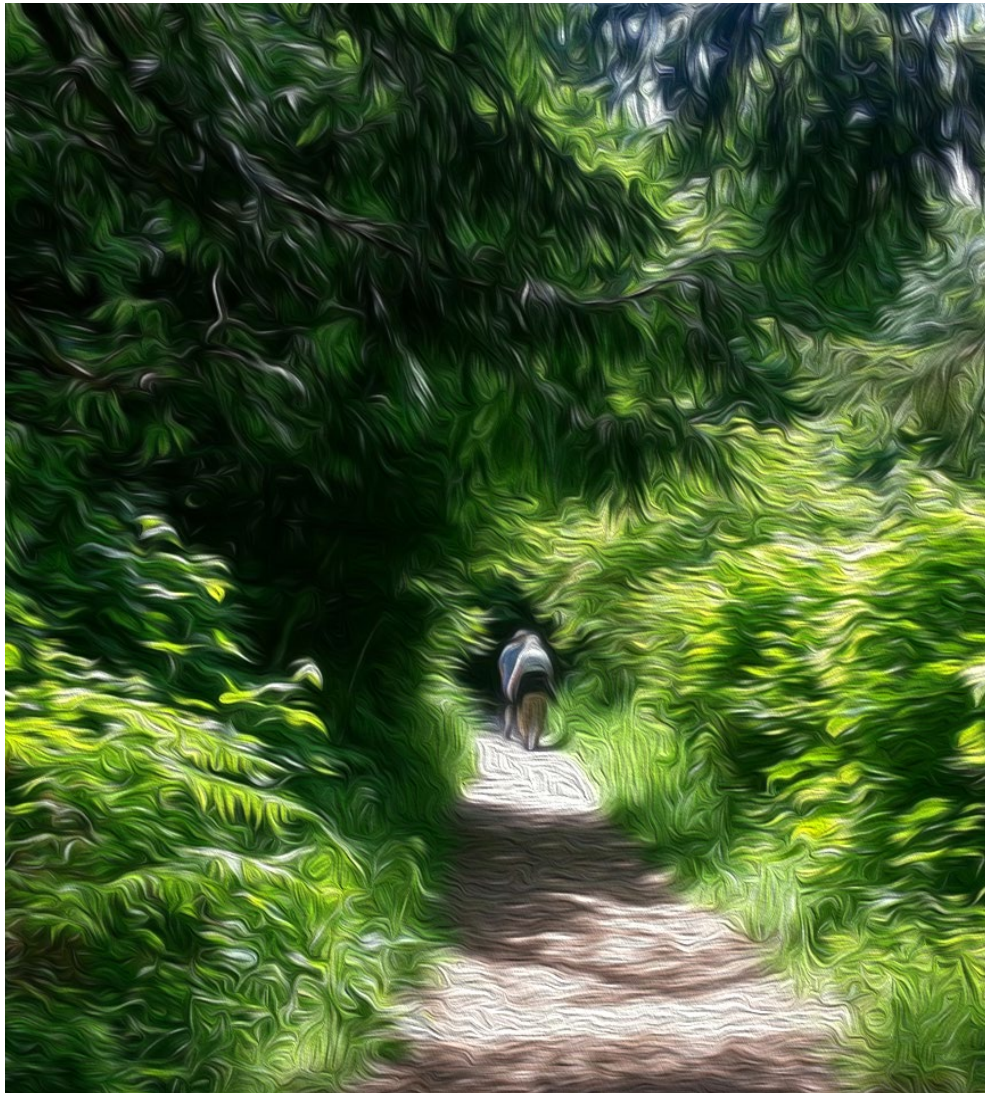
You may recall that plans for an update to McMinn Park appeared in the Spring 2017 issue of The Bugle. The park improvements were divided into 2 phases. Most of Phase 1 was completed last year, and the cold and rain did little to discourage people from enjoying the new playground, sport court, pickle ball court, and pathways over the winter. Pickle ball court surfacing, tree planting, and final grading adjacent to the tennis courts this spring will complete Phase 1. Grass seed has already begun to grow, and the temporary fencing will be removed when it is strong enough for foot traffic.

Phase 2, consisting of a small public washroom building and bike skills area, will be completed this summer (subject to approval of the 2018 capital budget request). The

washroom will be tendered over the next couple of months, with the intention that it be open in time for the peak summer season.

A Request for Proposals (RFP) went out in late February for the design and construction of a small bike-skills area. The process will include a meeting where youth will have the opportunity to be involved in the design. This meeting is anticipated to take place by early May. Stay tuned for details! We'll be posting signs in the park and BARA will be including information about this meeting on its website and on the message board at Broadmead Village.

Bus Service in Broadmead

In the next few months, the BARA Board will be discussing BC Transit service to Broadmead and seeking a meeting with appropriate officials. I would like to solicit comments, questions and concerns from Broadmead residents on the matter of bus service throughout the community.

In the past, the infrequency of service along Emily Carr (route 6A, with one of the lowest frequencies of service in the CRD), the absence of bus shelters at some heavily used stops along Royal Oak, the cancellation of bus runs without notification, and the location of bus stops have been issues identified by Broadmead residents.

More recently, concerns have included the speed of buses along Emily Carr and scheduling which has led to 'pass-ups' making it impossible for some residents to make it into work. The Legacy of Rithet’s Bog

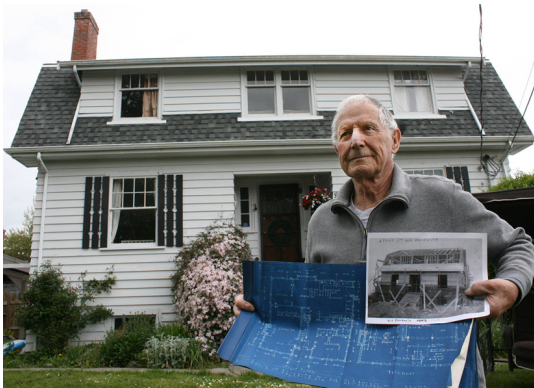
John (Jack) Burdge
1930 - 2017

A Key Figure in Broadmead History

Jack Burdge, who passed away recently, was an integral part of the history of Rithet’s Bog and the surrounding Broadmead area.

Jack’s family owned a dairy farm near Beckwith Avenue, on the south side of the Rithet Estate Farm. From the mid 1940’s to mid 1960’s, they also leased the Rithet Estate, at first in partnership with the Burkinshaw and Swan families, but eventually on their own. The Rithet lands were used to graze livestock in the uplands and grow fodder crops in the bottomlands of Rithet’s Bog. The Burdge family purchased Rithet’s Bog in the 1950’s when parts of the west end of the estate were subdivided as a result of construction of the original Pat Bay Highway.

Jack grew up exploring the Rithet Estate and rounding up cattle, living the cowboy dream that most of us had as kids, but also dealing with the associated nightmares the rest of us never had to face. Jack and his family continued to farm the area until the mid 1960’s. In 1965, Broadmead Farms bought the Rithet



Estate from the Rithet family, and also Rithet’s Bog from the Burdge family, to develop as the Broadmead community.

Jack was a member of the Rithet’s Bog Conservation Society during the late 1990’s and early 2000’s. His intimate local knowledge gained from decades of working on the site provided valuable input into the 2002 Restoration Project that installed the weir at the southwest corner of the park. Other work plugged the central drainage ditch and cleared willow from the West Wetland adjacent to Chatterton Way.

Jack would have liked to have seen the entire Rithet Estate kept as wilderness, so others could enjoy some of the experiences he had, but he was happy that Rithet’s Bog was preserved as a park and that he could play a part in its restoration.

What Caused Traffic Delays Along Royal Oak Drive During the Summer of 2017?

It may seem like a distant memory, but there were significant traffic delays last summer on Royal Oak Drive between Lochside Drive and Amblewood Drive. The construction also included sections of Amblewood Drive, Kentwood Terrace, and Cliffwood Place. Pipelines from Rithet’s Reservoir, located off Perez Drive, were upgraded and re-constructed to increase capacity. Rithet’s Reservoir, originally built in 1949, was uncovered. By the 1990s, it was apparent that the original reservoir needed replacing as it leaked badly and had poor seismic qualities. Demolition began in February 2014, with new walls and support columns installed by November 2014. Progress along the way was documented by Broadmead resident Ralph Ward in the Spring 2015 BARA Bugle.

The Rithet Reservoir replacement was an \$8.8 million project and involved demolishing the original reservoir and replacing it with a new earthquake-resistant structure. Project de/re-construction was spread over a two-year period. The new reservoir has been sunk deeper, with the new cover being installed by the early part of 2015. The site will be restored as best as possible and new vegetation planted around the perimeter of the reservoir.

The Rithet Reservoir holds 17,340 cubic metres of water (3.81 MM Imperial gallons) and is able to serve the Broadmead, Gordon Head, and Blenkinsop Valley areas of Saanich as a temporary water source in the event of a major earthquake.

Quite a few Broadmead residents are unaware of this landmark, and if you are one of them, why not make an opportunity to visit it?

Dog Walking in our Community

BARA recently received a note from the Falaise Community Association mentioning a resident who was threatened by an off-leash dog which its owner couldn’t control. This serves as a reminder that, when walking your dog, remember that not everyone is comfortable around dogs. It is the dog owner’s responsibility to ensure a dog doesn’t threaten or frighten other walkers. The following information applies to areas within our community.

- Rithet’s Bog: No dogs allowed except on the perimeter trail where dogs must be leashed
- Royal Oak Burial Park: Dogs must be leashed
- Lochside Trail within Blenkinsop Lake area: Must be leashed
- Quick’s Bottom Lands: No dogs allowed
- Any school grounds: Dogs must be leashed
- Within 10m of any playground equipment in any park: Dogs must be leashed

By the time you read this article, Saanich Council will have worked through many Budget sessions to set the revenues and expenditures for our municipality and ultimately to determine the taxes we will all pay. I can assure you we take this responsibility very seriously, and we will strive to achieve that balance that we know our residents want which is providing high quality services but at a financial level we can afford. It's a challenge, but clearly one of our most important responsibilities.

I thought you might be interested to know that our neighbour Cordova Bay is involved in an ongoing planning process over the next 18 months. Saanich is interested in hearing from any people who live, work, shop, or recreate in Cordova Bay, which lots of us do. Opportunities to share your ideas and concerns start in March, and you can get more information at www.saanich.ca/cordova.

Covenant Corner

Unlike any other community association in Saanich, the Broadmead Area Residents' Association ("BARA") helps residents on issues related to the covenants that restrict the use of most of the properties in Broadmead (and in the contiguous Donwood, Faithwood, and Pheasantwood areas). The covenants are included in the statutory building scheme that is registered on title to the property and they were designed to preserve the 'look and feel' of our community.

BARA receives numerous requests throughout the year from residents seeking assistance with a neighbour's purported violation of a covenant. The most numerous of these consist of the operation of an illegal suite, the chopping down of large trees, and the parking of trucks or RVs in front of properties. Complainants often expect BARA to act as an enforcement agent and 'take care of things' for them, however, that is not BARA's role.

Over the years, there have been legal developments which have changed the approach BARA can take on property use matters. It is clear, for example, that BARA cannot act as an enforcement agent, as it has no legal status on its own when it comes to any statutory building scheme. Rather, after receiving a complaint and determining that the statutory building scheme addresses the matter, BARA can inform the property owner and seek a resolution but, if it is not resolved by voluntary compliance, the complainant is the only party who can commence a legal action to enforce the covenant in the statutory building scheme. BARA can provide advice and can act as a mediator if the parties agree. Volunteers on our covenant committee spend a lot of time doing all of these things.

Another major development concerns the matter of suites. Apart from the fact that the statutory building schemes only allow an "in-law" suite in a home (that suite must be occupied by a family member and may not be offered for rent to any other person), Saanich has designated Broadmead as one in which it will not grant a "secondary suite" permit. In the case of an "in-law" suite, Saanich requires the homeowner to provide written confirmation that the suite will only be occupied by a family member. As a result, a "secondary suite" that is built in a home without a permit from Saanich not only contravenes the covenant in the statutory building scheme, it contravenes the municipal bylaw.

BARA can help residents who are uncertain about the covenants contained in a statutory building scheme but, if you have a question about the legal effect of a breach of a covenant, you should consult a lawyer.

Secretary
